

Rich in history, natural beauty, and unique attractions, Jones County has a lot to offer to those who are just visiting and to those who live here. Get ready to embrace charming towns, outdoor adventure, interesting museums, and quirky stops.

We have history lessons that are fun to learn in many of our museums. The Anamosa State Penitentiary Museum, housed next to lowa's oldest and largest penitentiary, interprets the institution's 150-year history as well as its current operation. To walk in the Old West, visit the pioneer village of Edinburgh, founded in 1847. For more area history, explore the heritage museums in Monticello, Olin, Oxford Junction, and Wyoming.

Dedicated to motorcycles and the rich history of two-wheeled transportation, the National Motorcycle Museum is filled with a display of more than 500 bikes, racing machines, toys, and thousands of other pieces of motorcycle memorabilia. Jones County is the birthplace of Grant Wood, most famous for "American Gothic," the painting of a dour couple, the farmer with a pitchfork held tightly in his grasp. Plan to visit the Antioch School, where Grant Wood's education started, the Grant Wood Art Gallery, dedicated to preserving the heritage of the artist, and Stone City, the location of Wood's 1930s Art Colony. The road leading you to these places is the Grant Wood Scenic Byway (Highway 64) where you will experience the beautiful wifeopen fields, river valleys, and rolling hills that inspired Grant Wood in his art.

Get ready to make memories when attending one of many local events. The Great Jones County Fair, held mid-July in Monticello, is the oldest and one of the largest fairs in the state. Each year, the fair rocks to some of the best concerts, has tractor and

Grant Wood Art Gallery

The Grant Wood Art Gallery is one of the highlights of Jones County. With the redesigned main gallery and added artifacts, they have more to offer visitors than ever before!

Gallery highlights:

• Prints of Grant Wood's paintings with educational information

The mission of the art gallery is to promote an appreciation of the arts and preserve the heritage of Grant Wood and the Stone City/Anamosa historic area.

The Grant Wood Art Gallery dedicated to preserving is and promoting the rich history of Grant Wood and his legacy as lowa's most famous artist. They are a non-profit organization run entirely by volunteers. Their location is in the heart of Anamosa. The birthplace of Grant Wood, gives visitors the opportunity to learn more about Grant Wood's early life and explore the beautiful area often referred to as "Grant Wood Country."

Starlighters II Theatre

Starlighters is a community theater located in downtown Anamosa. The theater was originally started in Monticello in 1974 when a high school student saw a need for more opportunities for individuals to participate in live theatre in the area. The student enlisted the help of a student teacher and the rest is history, as they say.

In 1978, the Anamosa Community Theatre merged with Starlighters. Today its active membership covers a six-county area.

During the 12-month seasons, Starlighters II presents four main stage productions consisting of dramas, comedies, musicals, and has included revues and variety shows. This year they added a children's theater production and special, onetime production written by a local playwright.

The theatre offers classes on acting and directing, which are aimed at helping those interested in learning those elements of theatre, and preparing them to work in Starlighters II productions.

In 2014, Starlighters moved across the street to its new, larger home (the former Motorcycle Museum), 200 E. Main St., Anamosa.

Antioch School/ Paint 'n Palette Club

Grant Wood Memorial Park in rural Anamosa is on Highway 64, the Grant Wood Scenic Byway. The park includes the Antioch School and the Paint 'n Palette Club cabin.

The Antioch School was built in 1872 and attended by the "American Gothic" artist, Grant Wood, from 1897 through 1901. The one-room schoolhouse is located in a rural farming area where you can see the hills and fields that shaped Grant Wood's artistic vision. The building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It is owned and maintained by the Jones County Historic Preservation Commission, a group of volunteers.

The Paint 'n Palette Club is a group of local artists, originally organized by those closely connected to Grant Wood. The club has been active and caring for the Antioch School since the 1950s.

Anamosa State Penitentiary Museum

The Anamosa State Penitentiary Museum showcases the more than 150-year history of Iowa's largest prison. The museum offers displays describing prison life, the role of the guard through the years, and a huge variety of photographs from the prison's early days. There are dioramas quarrying and construction of techniques used to build the prison, a full-sized replica of a cell, videos about the prison's overall history, the role of sports within the prison, and much more! While there, have your picture taken in the mock jail cell as well. You can also purchase a history book on the museum, written by two former employees of the prison.

The museum is located next to the

National Motorcycle Museum

The National Motorcycle Museum, a non-profit organization, was founded in 1989 by motorcycle enthusiasts. The mission of the museum is to provide visitors with an educational and entertaining experience. while preserving the history of motorcycles, racers, and riders. The National Motorcycle Museum's goal is to present their passion through interpretive exhibitions built around a fine collection of machines and historical artifacts from around the world.

The museum continues to gather vintage bikes, photographs, apparel, advertising art and other memorabilia to document all eras. There are over 500 motorcycles on display, spanning several decades and makes/models. Many motorcycles are on loan from private collectors from around the world. Some have also been donated to the Museum.

While at the Museum, stop and peruse the gift shop as well.

Camp Courageous

Camp Courageous serves nearly 10,000 campers with special needs in a year-round program.

Camp Courageous, located five miles southeast of Monticello, lies on approximately 400 acres of scenic wooded land, surrounded by thousands of acres of county park and state primitive land, and the Maquoketa River.

The camp is the largest year-round recreation and respite care facility for individuals with disabilities that is run on donations. Nearly 100,000 visitors visit the camp annually.

Camp Courageous offers a little bit of everything – canoeing, swimming, high and low rope courses, crafts, bowling, and more. Campers can also choose from caving, feeding the animals, hiking, outdoor living skills and archery.

Facilities at the camp are continually expanding and improving. Past expansions have included the John and Dorothy Sill Barn, the Beckwith Dormitory, a train and depot called the Lions Depot, Lake Todd, the Durgin Pavilion, Rotary Music Park and more. New to Camp this year is a 700 ft Zipline, the Penaluna Tunnel, Fishing Docks. The new Macek-Papke Multipurpose field is scheduled to open in September 2022.

Many of these spaces are available for rental when they are not in use by campers.

Riverside Gardens

Riverside Gardens, a city park, is located in Monticello, right off of Business Highway 151 north, near the Maquoketa River.

The gardens were started in 1989 and are planted and maintained by volunteers throughout the community. The gardens are a showcase for the diversity of flowers and plants available for today's gardens.

Riverside Gardens includes more than 25 flowerbeds. A picnic area, a gazebo, a wishing well, nature trails and a wetland area adorn the park.

Victorian street lights add light to the pathway through the gardens. A house adjacent to the property was purchased in 1998 by Riverside Gardens. The house is used for garden club meetings, plant and bake sales, and to house plants during the winter months.





In the front of the pergola sits the town's original "turn of the century" horse trough, which was once located in downtown Monticello.

The gardens are funded through memberships, donations, memorials, and annual plant and bake sales.

Monticello Heritage and Cultural Center

The Monticello Heritage and Cultural Center is housed inside the former St. Luke's United Methodist Church that was built in approximately 1949. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

The historical center is located at 211 N. Sycamore St., and is open 6-8 p.m. on Tuesdays, and 1-5 p.m. on Sundays.

The Center features unique pieces of Monticello history. The volunteer board of directors works hard to offer the community and visitors insight into Monticello's rich history. The center contains numerous historical photos, documents, paperwork, exhibits, and displays featuring items that highlight and tell the story of Monticello.

There are permanent and temporary displays featuring information on Monticello's sesquicentennial, businesses of long ago, the history of



the Great Jones County Fair, history of John McDonald Hospital, major fires in Monticello's history, the history of the railroad, military memorabilia, the history of Mon Maq Dam, the history of Ely's Stone Bridge, and so much more.

These displays are put together by local volunteers who have told their story about Monticello.

Edinburgh Village

Edinburgh was the first county seat in Jones County in 1840.

The first court case held in Jones County was presided over by Judge Thomas S. Wilson and was in session in Edinburgh on March 22, 1841.

In 1847, the county seat was moved to Anamosa.

Today, Edinburgh is home to the Jones County Historical Village and several events throughout the year.

The historical village contains multiple buildings housing various artifacts. The library contains books, maps, photos, newspaper clippings, and old county tax records from the 1850s to the 1940s, as well as school records and pieces of family histories. Other buildings house old clothing, tools, household items, and military uniforms.

The blacksmith shop on the

grounds contains a lot of history. Some buildings have been moved to Edinburgh: a blacksmith shop from Oxford Junction, a log home from Monticello, Anamosa's old railroad freight depot, a tenant house, a schoolhouse, and Jones County's first doctor's office. Built on site were a replica veterinary clinic, an agriculture building, a church, a log cabin, and a courthouse.

The historical village is located at 13838 Edinburgh Rd. in Scotch Grove. It is open from May through September on Sundays from 1 to 4 p.m. or by appointment. The facilities could be rented for picnics, weddings or special occasions.

Oxford Junction Heritage Museum

The Oxford Junction Heritage Museum is located at 107 W. Broadway St. in Oxford Junction. The museum is open from Memorial Day to Labor Day on Saturday mornings between 9 and 11 a.m. or by appointment.

The museum is housed in a building built shortly after the town fire of 1889. The building was purchased by C.A. Kettleson, and later became Benhart Feed & Produce. Both names still grace the front of the building.

The James Benhart Estate donated the building to the museum board in 1995, as they saw a need to not only preserve the building, but also as a place to store artifacts of historical importance to Oxford Junction. Items on display include a wagon box made by the Lasack Brothers & Co., original township records dating back to 1855, war memorabilia, and many Czech artifacts. The museum has several sections showcasing memorabilia from schools, the bank, military and Czech heritage.

The museum and Wregie Memorial Library next door can assist in researching family genealogy.

Hotel Williams Museum

The Wyoming Historical Museum, located on the south side of Wyoming's Main Street, is a tourist attraction in Eastern Jones County, Iowa.

A devastating fire in July 2013 nearly claimed the large building that was built in 1978 from Wyoming's native brick, and known as The Williams Hotel.

Twenty rooms have been renovated and displays showcase the history of the community.

Visitors enter into the hotel lobby and continue into a charming parlor displaying an old pump organ from 1872, as well as a theatre model "Player Piano."

Other displays include an oldfashioned drugstore, a library area with genealogy information, agricultural displays, farm machinery, and building/ plumbing supplies dating back to the late 1800s.

The rooms located upstairs each special have their own theme: barbershop, dentist office, school room, hotel room, quilt room. There is also a sports room with a display on Emil "Dutch" Levsen, a baseball player from Wyoming who pitched for the Cleveland Indians. There is also a gun room with an extensive collection of guns dating back to the 1700s. Railroad buffs will find interesting information and pictures of the railroad that was once a part of Wyoming.

Although the museum does not have regular hours for tours, they will open at any time a tour is desired.

Delaware County Historical Museum (Lenox College)

The Delaware County Historical Society's mission is "To preserve the past, in the present, for the future."

The Society owns and maintains nine buildings, including a church, dormitory, classroom spaces, gymnasium, train depot and caboose, one-room school, and two buildings that house agricultural equipment.

Among the collections are historic county newspapers, clothing, toys, pottery, tools and documents related to Delaware County and Lenox College students and faculty.

The campus is home to a Civil War monument. The monument was dedicated on Nov. 17, 1865. It is inscribed with the names of the 44 students and faculty that served and died in the Civil War. The monument and four campus buildings are designated as Historic Places on the National Registry.

The museum is located on the Delaware Crossing Scenic Byway



(Highway 38) in Hopkinton, lowa. The museum is open beginning June 1 ending Sept. 30, Tuesday through Sunday from 1 to 4 p.m. or by appointment.

Jones County Freedom Rock

The Jones County Freedom Rock is in the heart of historic Stone City. The rock and land were donated by Weber Stone, was painted in August 2021, and unveiled on Sept. 4, 2021. It was the 98th rock to be completed of the 100 Freedom Rocks in lowa.

Each Freedom Rock is unique to its area. Ray Michael "Bubba" Sorensen II started the Freedom Rock project in 1999, when he painted a thank-you to veterans on a rock in Menlo, Iowa. In 2008, Ray and his wife began thinking about painting "freedom rocks" in all 99 counties and this was the beginning of the Freedom Rock Tour. The Freedom Rock Tour mission is to spread the message of thanking our veterans while boosting tourism. In 2021, Ray completed his goal of having all 99 Freedom Rocks painted. The Jones County Freedom Rock is a massive 11-foot-tall boulder painted in stunning detail with several scenes. Depicted are:

• Military Highway 1, also known as Dillon's Furrow. It was the first federally funded highway west of the Mississippi.

• Grant Wood; not as the artist he became, but as the veteran he was, when he served in the U.S. Army during World War I.

• There is a POW/MIA tribute and a U.S. Flag so realistic the cloth seems to flow over the top of the stone.

• Jones County has the unique history of having a veteran from every major U.S. conflict reside here. These 11 veterans are represented in amazing likeness.

The Freedom Rock is the cornerstone of the Jones County display in a beautiful park-like setting. Efforts will continue to improve the Memorial Park to make it an area of pride for our veterans, our communities, and our county.

scenic Byways

The State of Iowa is home to 11 Scenic Byways. Two of those byways take travelers through Jones County.

The byways offer travelers with a unique experience through small-town lowa, while taking in the hills, farmland, wildlife and many more attractions, including historical sites, landmarks, and interpretative centers. You'll have the opportunity to shop, eat, and explore the outdoors, all while immersing yourself in lowa's history.

Grant Wood Scenic Byway

The Grant Wood Scenic Byway is aptly named after Jones County's famed artist, Grant Wood. This byway takes you through the rolling hills, which were featured in several of Wood's paintings.

Grant Wood Scenic Byway covers 80 miles of paved roadway through Jones and Jackson counties, primarily along Highway 64. You'll take in limestone bluffs; rivers (Wapsipinicon, Maquoketa and the Mississippi); wetlands; wildlife; timberland; farmland and more.

Depending on the time of year, you can take in the fall colors, or enjoy the winter activities such as skiing and snowmobiling. During the summer and spring months, there are plenty of campgrounds along the byway.

Grant Wood Scenic Byway includes numerous museums, historical sites, antique shops, restaurants, parks, and visitor centers.

Towns along the byway include: Anamosa, Andrew, Baldwin, Bellevue, Maquoketa, Monmouth, Springbrook, Stone City, and Wyoming.

Named attractions include: National Motorcycle Museum, Wapsipinicon State Park, Anamosa Penitentiary Museum, Starlighters II Theatre, Maquoketa Art Experience, Clinton Engines Museum, and Bellevue State Park Butterfly Garden.

Delaware Crossing Scenic Byway

The Delaware Crossing Scenic Byway loops for almost 40 miles, covering paved and gravel roads through Delaware County. 


Animal Tracking and Eagle Watching

Pumpkinfest

The Ryan Norlin GIANT Pumpkin Weigh-Off began in 1989 in Anamosa. The weigh-off competition was started by Tom Norlin, the uncle of Ryan Norlin, who dedicated the event to his 9-year-old nephew who lost his life in a boating accident earlier that year.

The weigh-off event generated such interest and enthusiasm that Anamosa community leaders came together to organize the annual Anamosa Pumpkinfest in 1990. In 1993 Anamosa was officially named the Pumpkin Capital of Iowa by the Iowa Legislature.

Held the first weekend in October, Saturday's events include: The Ryan Norlin GIANT Pumpkin Weigh-Off, 5K run/walk, chili cook-off, Detector Dogs, pumpkin toss, kids' games, the popular Pumpkinfest Parade, and more.

The winning pumpkin at the first Weigh-off in 1989 was 253 pounds. Since then, the state record for the largest pumpkin has been broken several times at Pumpkinfest.

Wyoming: The Christmas City


Wyoming, a town of about 500 people, has long been known as the "Christmas City." The town puts on a spectacular display of Christmas lights as residents and visitors take in the sights.

• Wayside Park – J&P Cycles of Anamosa maintains the Wayside Park on U.S. Highway 151 a mile north of Anamosa.

• Aqua Court – The park features the aqua court, with sand volleyball courts nearby. It is located on South Linn Street at Wapsiana Park.

• **Remley Woods** – This is a wooded area for family picnics. It is located on North Williams Street.

• St. Patrick's Park – A residential park with a ball diamond and playground equipment, on North High Street.

• Athletic Park – This includes six ball diamonds and the Monroe Tennis Courts. It is located by the Wapsipinicon River.

• Grant Wood Memorial Park – This park is located four miles east of Anamosa on Highway 64.

• Fountain Park – Located behind the Lawrence Community Center, it is a flower garden park with turn-of-the-century accents from historic downtown Anamosa.

• Izaak Walton Park – The Ikes maintain grounds along the Wapsi, just off Highway 151 south of Anamosa.

• Wapsipinicon State Park – This 400-acre park includes hiking, climbing, nature study, fishing in the Wapsipinicon River, modern camping, picnicking and golf.

• Anamosa Chamber Park – Located on North Huber Street in downtown Anamosa.

CENTER JUNCTION

• City Park – This park includes a ball diamond, playground equipment and picnic area.

• Jones County Central Park – This 297acre park is located four miles southeast of Amber off County Roads X44 and E29 and Central Park Road. It features a 25-acre lake and seven-acre fishing pond, swimming beach, kayak and paddleboat rentals, sand volleyball area, hiking trails, storybook walk, campground, and Nature Center (open weekends, 1-5 p.m., Memorial Day thru Labor Day Weekend).

MARTELLE

• Wayside Park – This little park is located just off Highway 1. It features a picnic shelter and playground equipment.

MONTICELLO

• City Park – This park is home to the Great Jones County Fair (scheduled for July 20-24, 2022) and is located along North Maple Street.

• Austin Smith Inclusive Playground – Scheduled for completion in August 2022, this new playground is located near the Monticello Aquatic Center. It is designed for children of all ages, all abilities. It contains components where children of different abilities can play together. There is also sensory equipment for children on the autism spectrum.

• Jacobs Park – The park includes a playground. It's located in the Goettsch Addition between Fourth and Fifth Streets.

• Panther Park – This park/playground is located behind Shannon Elementary School on South Street.

• Pictured Rocks – This 1,138-acre park is located four miles south of Monticello on Highway 38 and three miles east, near Camp Courageous of Iowa. It features a concrete river access, gathering site, hiking trail, rock climbing routes, picnic shelter, hunting, and stream fishing. Pictured Rocks is within the Indian Bluffs-Pictured Rocks Bird Conservation Area.

• **Pocket Park** – This opened in August 2016, and came about after a 2012 fire destroyed downtown buildings. It is located downtown on E. First St., and features picnic tables, benches and a water fountain.

• Riverside Gardens – This area, located along Bus. Highway 151 on the north edge of the city, features wetlands, nature trails, many flower beds, a picnic area, a gazebo and wishing well.

• Willow Park – Located right off Oak St., this shelter is home to the Farmers Market and horseshoe pits. It is adjacent to the 18-hole Baty Disc Golf Course.

• Fountain Park – This small park is located at Monticello's south entrance where Business Highway 151 intersects with South Cedar Street.

MORLEY

• Miller Park – This park features basketball and volleyball facilities.

OLIN

• Olin City Park – This park is located on Maple Street and features camping facilities, playground equipment, ball diamonds, an enclosed shelter and more.

ONSLOW

• Chamberlain Park – This park includes a picnic shelter and ball field.

OXFORD JUNCTION

• Wapsie Park – This park, located on the American Legion grounds, features ball fields, playground equipment and picnic areas. SCOTCH GROVE

• Bud Harms Memorial Park – This park features a restored railroad depot and a picnic area. It is located along Highway 38 across from Scotch Grove.

WYOMING

• The Smallest National Park in the U.S. – This park is actually a monument across from the post office on Main Street on the Calkins property.

CONSERVATION AREAS

• Mon-Maq Dam – Located one mile northeast of Monticello along the Maquoketa River, this river access includes 44 acres of riverine habitat. Use extreme caution near the Mon-Maq Dam. People should not venture over, on, or close to these structures, or they will risk drowning.

• Hale Wildlife Area – This 261-acre area is located northeast of Hale and offers upland hunting, hiking and pond fishing.

• Stone City Access – One acre, along the Wapsipinicon River, this boat access is located within historic Stone City.

• Ebys Mill Wildlife Area – 525 acres of wild and undeveloped woodland ravines and bluffs along the Maquoketa River. Open to hunting, hiking, bird watching, and stream fishing.

 Anamosa Boat Ramp – Located at the entrance to the state-owned Wapsipinicon State Park, this modern boat ramp provides access to the Wapsipinicon River above the Anamosa Dam. CAUTION: Use extreme caution near the Anamosa Dam. People should not venture over, on, or close to these structures, or they will risk drowning.

• Olin Recreational Area – Located one mile north of Olin along Highway 38, this 19-acre area provides walk-in fishing at two ponds frequently flooded by the Wapsipinicon River.

• Jungletown River Access – This oneacre area, located three miles south of Hale, provides a boat ramp access to the Wapsipinicon River.

• Oxford Mills Access – This historic mill site includes a total of 16 acres in Oxford Mills, offering a river access and shelter house for gatherings.

• Iowa 136 Access – This undeveloped river and shore fishing access is located on three acres, seven miles south of Cascade along lowa Highway 136.

• Newport Mills – Wapsipinicon River access with gravel boat ramp access on one acre, located six miles northeast of Olin.

• Scotch Grove Prairie – Hike the trails of this 69-acre restored prairie and wetlands. Public hunting is allowed.

• Hamilton and Tapken Prairie Preserve – Explore the native prairie remnants of these 80 acres, located north of Onslow on 60th Ave. • Whitewater and Lost Canyon – Hike or cross country ski the trails through 562 acres of timber, restored prairie, and riverine habitat. Hunting is allowed. Located east of Cascade on Highway 151, and south on Curoe Road.

DNR WILDLIFE AREAS

• Muskrat Slough – This 727-acre site is open to hunting, hiking and wildlife viewing. It's an excellent location for birding, kayaking or canoeing.

• Indian Bluff Wildlife Area – It has 1,400 acres of mostly undeveloped wooded bluffs and upland along the Maquoketa River south and east of Monticello.

• Olin Access – This is a nine-acre Wapsipinicon River access site on the north edge of Olin.

• Oxford Juntion Wildlife Management Area – 560 acres of grasslands, timber, and wetlands located along the Wapsipinicon River just southeast of Oxford Junction. Hunting allowed.

• Searryl's Cave State Preserve – This 43acre natural cave created by water movement through limestone bedrock is located 10 miles southeast of Cascade in Jones County.

Farmers Markets

Monticello

Monticello's farmers market is located in the Willow Shelter by Pizza Ranch off E. Oak Street. Vendors open for the season beginning in May and close up shop in October when the weather starts to turn.

The farmers market is open on Wednesdays from 3 to 5:30 p.m. and Saturdays from 8 to 11 a.m.

Anamosa

Anamosa hosts a farmers market during the warmer months, generally June through October, unless the weather turns cold earlier than expected.

Their farmers market is open on Wednesdays from 3 to 6 p.m. and Saturdays from 6 a.m. to noon. It's located at the intersection of Main Street and Scott Street.

Hopkinton

The Delaware County Historical Museum campus (Lenox College) hosts outdoor vendors for the farmers market on Thursdays from 3 to 6 p.m. beginning the first Thursday of June ending the first Thursday of October.

Various vendors set up under the beautiful tree canopy to sell vegetables, baked goods, maple syrup, potted herbs and hand-crafted items. All vendors are local individuals who have a variety of goods to please everyone.



Monticello

In 1836, Daniel Varvel from Kentucky and William Clark from Ohio came from the lead mines near Dubuque, seeking to settle on fertile land

in the wilderness. They selected the south bank of the Maquoketa River on the site of what is now known as Monticello, because of the closeness to both the river and Kitty Creek.



Virginia, was incorporated in 1867.

Monticello had its beginning, from the first two lonely settlers, the pioneer village grew until today where it is a bustling, progressive town of over 3,800 in population.

Located on Highway 151, the town was also served by the Milwaukee Railroad and the Greyhound Bus Line.

Anamosa

Anamosa was once known as Lexington, and became the official county seat of Jones County. Some of the earliest settlers were Gideon H. Ford, who built the first sawmill and tavern/inn. It was here where a Native American family stayed during their visit to Anamosa.

In 1842, a family was passing through and visited the Ford Inn. The little girl was named Anamosa. After the family moved on to the West, they seemed to leave quite an impression on the town. Following the family's departure, the publisher of the Anamosa Journal-Eureka, Edmund Booth, suggested the town's name be change to Anamosa. The name change became official in 1851.

Wyoming

The town of Wyoming was incorporated in 1873, and named after Wyoming County, N.Y.

In the 1850s, James A. Bronson came from Wyoming County, N.Y., and bought the present town site from Thomas Green at \$14 an acre. With his brother, B.K. Bronson, and C.J. Marsh, the men platted the town in the winter of 1855, unofficially calling it Marshfield.



Wyoming's claim to fame is being known as the "Christmas City." During the holiday season, visit Wyoming for its canopy of lights and other familyfun Christmas events.

The Hotel Williams Historic Museum contains three floors, 9,000 square feet, of exhibits. The hotel was built in 1878.

Amber

The village of Amber was founded in 1873 when W.H. Sanford established a store at a location two miles west of the Midland Railroad depot.

Amber was originally called Blue Cut. This name was derived from a deep cut the right-of-way builders drove through a nearby hill of solid blue clay. The name was changed to Amber in 1878 at the suggestion of Sanford.

Center Junction

Center Junction had its beginning in October 1871, when its proprietors, James A. Bronson, S.W. Johnson, John M. Squires and Kinsey Elwood had the town site surveyed and laid out into lots and blocks.

It was about that same year when the Midland branch of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad and the Davenport and Monticello branch of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad completed their lines through the village. The town, being located near the geographical center of the county and being at the junction of the two railroads, very naturally took the name of Center Junction.

Langworthy

Once a station for the "underground railroad," which transported slaves out of the South, Langworthy came



into being in January 1858. In that year, the village of Langworthy was laid out in town lots by Col. W.T. Shaw.

One of the chief industries of Langworthy was its creameries. The Crescent Creamery was established in 1879. The building was built near the old Langworthy depot. The Crescent Creamery butter was recognized as a superior article and found a ready market at the highest prices in New York and Philadelphia.

Martelle

Martelle, located in southwest Jones County, was platted in 1872 when the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroads were being built through the neighborhood. The town's beginning is much the same as Center Junction, due to the railroad.

Today, Martelle is home to about 240 residents.

Morley

The main line of the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroads is responsible for the establishment of the town of Morley in southern Jones County. The town was

originally called Viroqua, and was platted in 1873. In 1886, it was renamed Morley.



Today, there are approximately 50 residents.

Olin

Olin is the oldest platted town in Jones County. It was platted and surveyed in 1840.

Olin was first known as Elk Ford. It's located in southern Jones County, on the north bank of Walnut Creek, a short distance from the Wapsipinicon River. According to Indian legend, this was thought to be an ideal location, between two waterways; no tornado could strike here.

In 1878, a petition was circulated by D.A. Olin, superintendent of the Milwaukee Railroad, to change the town's name to Olin.

communities

Onslow

Onslow was founded in the spring of 1871 by E.M. Franks. The town was first called Franksburg, but Franks demanded to have the name changed to Onslow, the name of the first governor of the State of Maine.

Today, the town has a population of roughly 250 people.



Oxford Junction

Oxford Junction, or "OJ" to the locals, is located in the far southeastern corner of Jones County.

The town was originally known as Garfield. It was settled due to the cross over (or junction) of the Davenport, St. Paul, Sabula, Ackly, and Dakota Railroads in 1872. Those rails continued on to Monticello, also connecting Davenport to Cedar Rapids.

OJ has about 450 residents.
